as necessary for acquiring a complete knowledge of her profession. Once instil into women the fact that what is required is thoroughness, to make all branches of their work worthy, and that this can only be obtained by concentration of purpose and infinite patience, and we shall soon cease to sigh over the shortcomings of the half-trained woman; for it is not only in nursing the sick that half training is found to be so terribly disastrous—it is the canker in the whole system of woman's up-bringing and education. average-going woman-what are her acquirements? A smattering of a dozen things; perfection in none. She can neither converse *intelligently*, read eloquently, nor write half-a-dozen consecutive lines grammatically. Why? Simply from this deplorable lack of concentration of purpose. Ah! that thoroughness was the chief characteristic of our sex, rather than the reverse! I once heard an old hospital sister remark with pride, pointing to her ward nurse—"She's an uncommon sharp gal, is Agnes. I've only had her seven years, and I've larned her to be a nuss."-MATRONA.
