Looked at from the utilitarian point of view, it certainly appears as if there might be an opening in this direction for some brave, patient women, for insanity exists in the highest classes, and it is certain that many would prefer a trustworthy person to assume sole charge of their mentally afflicted relatives or children in the house, to sending them away to the costly Private Asylum, among strange surroundings. But the work is perhaps the saddest and most dispiriting in the world, and no woman should take it up who cannot face fearlessly much that is horrible and revolting." S.G.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SALISBURY NURSES' HOME.—The report for the past year showed a decrease in the amount of earnings of the Institute. There had been many more applications for the Nursing of the poor than usual. From the 1st January to the 31st December there had been nine hundred and sixty-four weeks of Nursing and one hundred and eighty-six cases. There had been ninety-two weeks of reduced price or wholly gratuitous Nursing cases. The committee were glad to announce the receipt of a legacy of  $\pounds$  100 from Mr. B. Lancaster.

THE following appeal appeared in the Manchester Examiner and Times:---"Your readers will probably have seen through the medium of your columns that a Day Nursery for Salford is in a fair way to be established. The following ladies and gentlemen form the committee for working it. Their names are a guarantee that the work will be well and thoroughly done. We, therefore, appeal to the public for funds to assist us. We cannot start until we have £150.
