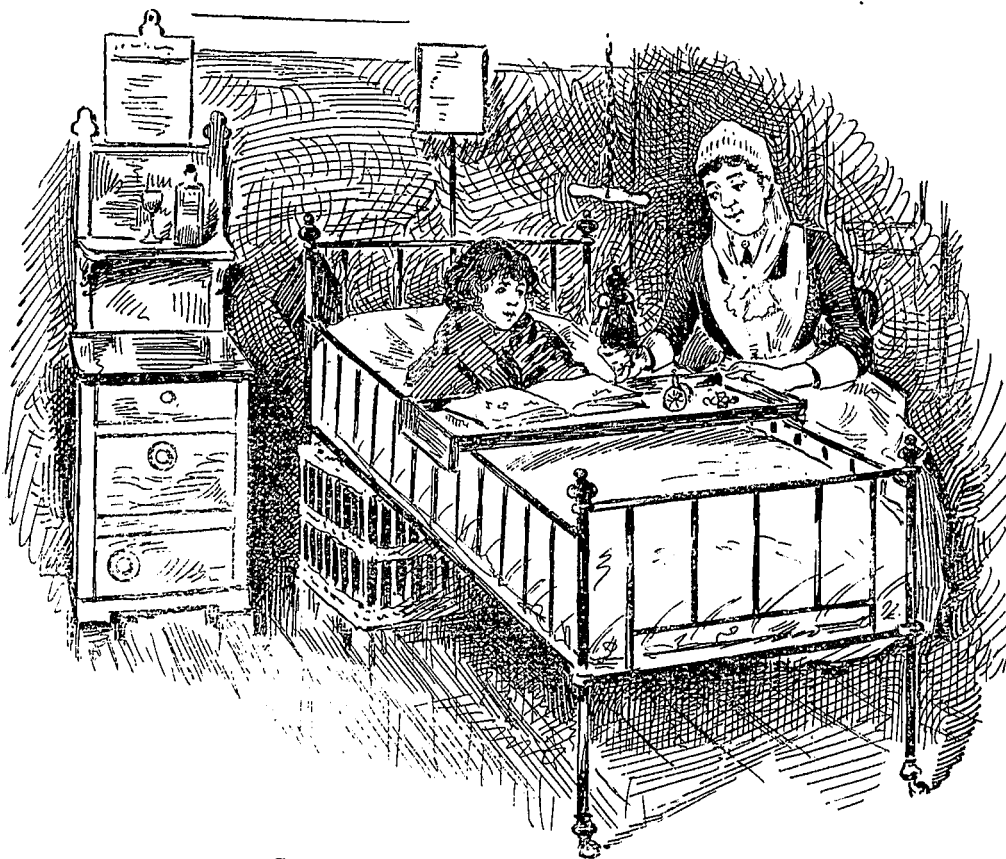

Clarke, Nicholls and Coombes, Limited, of Hackney Wick, deserve the thanks of every member of the Nursing profession for having put within their reach, in the most portable form yet introduced, in packets sufficient to make respectively a half-pint, a pint, and a quart of a most delicious jelly, which is, as they truly say, equal to bottled jelly, at one-fourth the price. One very favourable feature is the "just" consistency of the jelly when made—neither too light nor too "stodgy," both unpleasant features too often met with in jelly making. The packets we have tried have been deliciously flavoured and the resultant jellies were pretty and bright in colour, and what is a most important feature, they keep fresh a long time. The cost is threepence for a half-pint packet. The directions for making are simple, explicit, and easily carried out, very little preparation being required. They can be had from all grocers, &c.

THE PATENT MUSIC PAGE PROTECTOR AND RAPID TURN OVER (Proprietors: Sampson Low, Marston & Co., Ltd., St. Dunstan's House, Fetter Lane, E.C.).—Advantages: (1) The edges of pages of music (which are turned over hundreds of times) are protected from being torn, and when torn can be repaired by the use of this simple protector; (2) If the sections are cut out as directed, it will be found that you can rapidly turn over the pages without turning more than one at a time. This is a particularly useful article which is sure to be appreciated by all those who love "tidy" music. Next to seeing a book dog-eared, the most painful thing is the "wearing out" of the corners of sheet music, the disarticulation of the pages, and other like irritabilities, which are all easily prevented by adopting a "protector." A child can apply them. A sixpenny packet will protect the edges of eighty pages of music, and they can be obtained through all music sellers, &c.
