OUR Birmingham Correspondent informs us that the Queen Victoria Nursing Institution, which was established in Wolverhampton in commemoration of her Majesty's Jubilee in 1887, is to come into practical existence and begin its work in June next. By the generosity of an old townsman, who has offered to defray rent, rates, and taxes for one year, premises have been taken in Clifton Terrace, Chapel Ash, and a Lady Superintendent has been appointed. It is proposed to commence with a staff of highly-trained Medical, Surgical, and Monthly Nurses, and to add, as the growth of the Institution permits, District Nurses for attendance upon the sick poor.

WE most heartily congratulate the Carlisle Sick Provision Fund upon—with the able financing of Mr. Crowder, the hon. treasurer—its splendid financial position. We only wish that such an institution, small though it may be, could be more generally imitated, as far as the careful husbanding of its monetary affairs is concerned.
