ings of this sort would do a great deal of good in clearing away misconceptions which existed as to the meaning and scope of Registration. He thought everyone must agree with the views of the Nurses' Association which they had just heard explained. MISS COOPER asked whether on the Register, Nurses would be also classed together, or whether they would be graded as to their degrees of nursing knowledge, or as to the special department they have worked in. MISS WOOD replied that probably the Register would merely show the name of the Nurse, where she was educated, and by what examination she had shown her fitness for Registration. After some further discussion, as no objections were raised, the Resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

DR. SCHOFIELD then proposed, "That the best thanks of this meeting be accorded to Mrs. Head for her most kind hospitality, and to the Rev. Mr. Wrightson for taking the chair on this occasion." He strongly supported the scheme of the Association, and gave examples from his own experience to show the importance of the question to Doctors. Finally, he put the resolution to the meeting, when it was carried by acclamation. The vote was acknowledged by the chairman, and this very interesting and successful meeting then closed. * * *
