solution as directed, (6) Carefully avoid exposure to cold during convalescence, (7) Hang sheet saturated with disinfectant outside door of sick room, (8) Wear only washable materials: After Case is over, (9) Disinfect room and self.

Typhus Fever: (1) The freest ventilation, (2) Save Patient all exertion, (3) Carefully attend to feeding, (4) Live well yourself, (5) Prevent other persons coming into sick room, (6) Burn all clothes

possible.

Diphtheria: (1) Keep room warmed to 65° or 70° F., (2) Keep bronchitis kettle going, (3) Save Patient all exertion, (4) Avoid contact with discharges from throat and nose, (5) Prevent kissing of Patient, (6) Use rags and burn them.

HER MAJESTY the Queen has been pleased to present the Rev. A. L. B.
