THE friends and supporters of the Central Association for Nursing the Sick Poor in Brighton and neighbourhood wish to bring before the generous residents in Brighton and the neighbourhood, and all at a distance, to whose sympathy they appeal, the importance of the work which has been done by the Association for many years, and their present need of special help. In a district so thickly populated, it is evident that there must be considerable poverty and great consequent suffering, and it is felt that, not only among those who reside in this pleasant sea-side resort, but especially amongst those who visit Brighton and benefit greatly in their own health, there are many who would be glad to assist in a work which recommends itself to the sympathies of all. At present the Association is working with a small staff of Nurses quite inadequate to the great need for their services amongst more than sixty thousand poor inhabitants, not reckoning the outlying villages, where similar help is much needed. The Nurses, who are thoroughly qualified for their duties by professional training, undertake many cases weekly, some requiring three and four visits daily. They carry out all necessary sanitary arrangements, doing their utmost to comfort and relieve the suffering, instructing the friends or relatives of the patient in all needful ways, and refusing no office of kindness "to those who have none else to care for them." The work is entirely unsectarian, all who need sympathy being helped with equal gladness. To support a larger number of Nurses, and in other ways meet the necessities of the many cases which claim their help, the promoters of this truly needful work appeal with confidence to the sympathy of the public, feeling sure of a ready response.
