times throughout the year. A whiff of fresh air daily, and a night's sleep, or, in the case of night duty, very greatly diminished hours, do not seem, from a Nurse's standpoint, exorbitant demands. It will be long, I fear, however, before they are universally conceded."

I HEAR that a meeting will be held—by the kind permission of the Duke of Devonshire—at Devonshire House, Piccadilly, on June 26, at 5.30 p.m., in aid of the scheme for establishing a Convalescent and Holiday Fund for Nurses. The influential Committee which has undertaken the matter, I see, comprises H.R.H. Princess Christian, the Duchess of Abercorn, Theresa Countess of Shrewsbury, Lady Edward Cavendish, Lady George Hamilton, Lady Audrey Buller, Mrs. Ernest Hart, Miss Stephen Holland, Mrs. Jeune, Mrs. Lucas, Miss Catherine J. Wood, Mr. Lankester, Mr. Salmond, and others. The Trustees are the Duke of Abercorn and Mr. Jeune, Q.C.; the Treasurer is Mr. Alderman Savory; and the Hon. Secretary Mrs. Bedford Fenwick. It is needless to wish the scheme success, because with such names as the foregoing that may be taken as already assured.

I AM glad to hear that Miss Adelaide Watson, Registered Nurse, has been appointed a Sister at Haslar Hospital, which of course most of my readers know is the chief Naval Hospital. Miss Watson was trained and certificated at the Radcliffe Infirmary, then worked for about two years at St. Mary's Hospital, and finally acted for some months as a Staff Nurse at Gordon House Nursing Home.

I LEARN that the following arrangements have been made for the Congress and Exhibition in connection with the Sanitary Institute at Brighton, which commences August 25. Conference of Medical Officers of Health : President, Arthur Newsholme, M.D., D.P.H., M.O.H. Conference of Inspectors of Nuisances : President, Alfred Carpenter, M.D. London, M.R.C.P., C.S.S. Cambridge. On Tuesday there will be a *Conversazione* in the Pavilion building; Wednesday, Lecture to the Congress by W. H. Preece, F.R.S.; and on

Saturday there will be excursions and an address to the working classes by Benjamin Ward Richardson, M.D., LL.D., F.R.S. The meetings of the Congress and Exhibition will be held in the Pavilion buildings.

THE lectures in anatomy and physiology given by the Hon. Staff of the York County Hospital for the higher education and training of the Nurses in the York County Hospital have been brought to a close. The attendance has been regular, and the interest displayed throughout the course as something apart from the routine duties has been most satisfactory. In physiology there were two written examinations and fourteen papers sent in on each occasion. In the first examination, nine out of the fourteen obtained over fifty per cent. of the available marks, and of these nine, three obtained over seventy-five per cent. In the second examination, five were over fifty per cent., and of these five three were over seventy-five per cent. The first prize was gained by Nurse Florence Simpson, and the second by Nurse Annie Parnaby. During the summer the Nurses have a course of lectures on Nursing, and have clinical instruction in the Wards.
