MISS GEORGIE MONTGOMERY, M.B.N.A. :-

Half a teacupful of best pearl barley, a quart cold water; put them into a saucepan, let it come to a boil. Strain off the water, put back the barley into saucepan, with one and a-half pints of hot water; let it boil for an hour, stirring often. Strain into a clean jug, and stand till cold. Then pour off the top clear part into another jug. Sweeten with castor sugar, and add a teaspoonful of fresh lemon juice.

MISS L. HERN :-

Wash 202. of fine pearl barley, boil it five minutes in a pint of water, strain, put the barley into a jug, pour over it a quart of boiling water, cover it closely with a cloth, let it stand till cold; then stir it up, strain, and keep for use. Lemon juice may be added.
