Miss Eastwood.—Marine sponges are now very much out of favour with the majority of leading Surgeons, and should only be used for one operation. And in operations where there is likely to be much hæmorrhage little sponges of Gamgee tissue, which a Nurse can make for herself, are now in general use, and are inexpensive. Use a many-tailed bandage made of dimity and lined with mull-muslin to prevent irritation of the skin.

Private Nurse (Kensington).—I imagine the tablets are made of per-chloride of mercury and chloride of ammonium, and if so, they should be dissolved in distilled water. Get those prepared by Messrs. C. G. Hewlett and Sons, Charlotte Street, E.C. A solution can be made with ordinary tap-water containing lime salts.
