There have unfortunately been more than the usual number of deaths under chloroform in this country recently. It is to be hoped that the results arrived at by the Commission may do something to diminish their number in the future.

Some time ago the building committee of the Blackburn and East Lancashire Infirmary opened a competition for the best and most practical design for a Nurses' Home, and the plans submitted by Messrs. Simpson and Duckworth, local architects, were ultimately accepted. The building is to give accommodation for thirty Nurses and two domestic servants, and to include recreation-rooms, reading-room, small waiting-room, adjacent to entrance, home Sisters' sitting-room, linen-room, two box-rooms, kitchen, scullery, and pantry, thirty bed-rooms for Nurses and one for servants, two bath-rooms, and the usual conve-niences. The building will be a handsome structure of red brick, three stories high, in a style suited to that of the Infirmary, with which the Home will be connected by a covered way. The Home promises to be a model establishment, the distribution of the rooms in the three stories being most convenient, and the sanitary arrangements perfect; all being effected by the com-paratively small outlay of  $\pounds 3,477$ . S. G.
