"BIGOTRY AT NORFOLK HOSPITAL .- At the quarterly meeting of the Governors of the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital, held on Saturday last, the Board of Management reported, among other matters, that they had received notice from several subscribers of their intention to withdraw their support from the Hospital, in consequence of the retention of the Lady Superintendent. The amount represented by these discontinued subscriptions was stated to be from £65 to £70. The reasons alleged are that Miss Adam, the Lady Superintendent, having become a Catholic, has not thought fit to resign her position. There is no rule that states the Lady resign her position. There is no rule that states the Lady Superintendent shall not be a Catholic any more than any of the Nurses or officials. There is nothing in her agreement about what religion, if any, she is to profess; and her thorough efficiency is denied by nobody. She has been for fourteen years the Matron there. It is now a little over twelve months since she became a Catholic, and yet all has gone on much the same as before. No Nurse or patient, much less any of the members of the Board of Management, have been wheedled out of the religious convictions of a lifetime. No one's conscience has been tampered with. And yet a few purse-proud bigots who would regulate religious profession and practice by a money standard, can-not bring themselves to forgive Miss Adam for her change of faith. However, the Institution is likely to go on in spite of their cruel abstention, and not only to go on, but to prosper.'

"A REBUKE FOR THE BIGOTS.—As an answer to the miserable manœuvre to persecute the Lady Superintendent, a brave woman who has had the courage of her convictions, the subscriptions from the general public to the Norwich Hospital have exceeded by ζ_{71} the collections of last year. The people do not regard the Norwich Hospital as a mere branch of the Anglican Church, or an appurtenance or a perquisite of any Church or section of religionists. The High Sheriff and others have declared their intention to support Miss Adam, and there is not the least doubt that the working people and many of the clergy and Nonconformist ministers are heartily sympathetic with her cause. She will not be male a Jonah of to gratify the spleen of a few who do not understand, and certainly do not practise, the very rudiments of Christian teaching and conduct. Recant, resign, or starve is the stand-and-deliver cry of these militant Christians, and Miss Adam replies with a calm, emphatic 'No.'"
