Miss Lonsdale.—Take the *Chemist and Druggist*. Advertisements for qualified assistants appear in its columns.

Midwife.—Begin by getting a thorough training as a Nurse in a children's and then in a General Hospital; after which train in midwifery and gain the Diploma of the Obstetrical Society.

Miss Applford.—Apply to the Director-General of the Army Medical Department, Victoria Street, Westminster. Three years' training is necessary before you can be appointed one of Her Majesty's Nursing Sisters.

Probationer (Greenwich).—We are not surprised to hear there is a vacancy in the Hospital you mention, but if you value your good name we should most strongly advise you not to fill it; rather wait a few months and enter a Hospital where the regulations are just and up to the modern standard of three years' training. You can study meanwhile; elementary anatomy and physiology, chemistry, and cookery are all subjects which will be of the utmost value to you as a Nurse.

Miss Dale (Newcastle).—Get "Norris's Nursing Notes," 2s. post free, from our office.
