tion. It exists, an l Miss MARSDEN was able to bring back a considerable quantity of it with her for examination. With a considerable quantity of it with her for examination. reference to its alleged virtues in the cure of leprosy, however, no trustworthy evidence could be obtained. Any attempt to test its properties on the unfortunate lepers was, in their present condition, out of the question. Where every law of health and sanitation was being defied the application of such a remedy would have been worse than useless. On arriving at the leper district Miss MARSDEN'S first care was to make a tour of inspection of the 'yourtes.' This, however, was a matter of no little difficulty. They are scattered about in the depths of primeval forests hundreds of versts apart, and their situation is for the most part unknown to the authorities. After some trouble she got together a body of about thirty men, who were able to act as guides. Her tour extended over three thousand versts, and occupied about six weeks. The whole party, mounted on the small horses of the country, were formed in single file, and a path had to be cut through the thick undergrowth to enable them to advance. It was impossible to state even approximately, the number of lepers in that part of Russia, as the authorities have taken no trouble to compile a statistical return. number in the Sereane Veluisk district has been roughly estimated at three hundred, but there is no means of knowing how far this computation is correct. It is Miss MARSDEN's intention to return to Yakutsk, and to establish a leper colony at Veluisk, on the river Velui.'

I AM asked to announce that the Court of Common Council of the City of London have voted a grant of fifty guineas towards the fund now being raised for the extension of the Richmond Hospital, Surrey, and the establishment of a Children's Ward thereat, and that by a letter dated the 19th April last, Her Serene Highness the Princess MAY OF TECK informed the Committee "That it would give her great pleasure for the new Ward to be named after her—'Princess May's Ward.'"

THE DUCHESS OF PORTLAND opened a new wing of the East London Children's Hospital, at Shadwell, last Saturday. Mr. CHESTON, Chairman of the Committee, presented the Duchess with a silver key as a very appropriate memento of the occasion. There has been a great deal of interest shown amongst the poor in the locality, in the enlargement of an Institution which is so greatly needed amongst them. One working-man, indeed, has gone so far as to collect one thousand farthings from the children in the neighbourhood, seven of whom presented their little bags of these humble coins to the Duchess. It was a touching proof of the interest felt by the poor; but one does not like to think of the immense amount of work which it must have required to raise this solitary
