GERMS.

To the Editor of "The Nursing Record."

Sir,—With reference to "a Nurse's" appeal to the medical profession to forbid Nurses wearing dresses with trains out of doors, on the plea that the wearers must by so doing carry germs into their Wards on their return to duty, may I venture to inquire whether she is in the habit of wearing the same dress out of doors as she does in the Wards? for to me that seems an unlikely and almost unheard-of thing for a Nurse to do. There are very few of us, I should imagine, who care to go out carrying with us the germs from our Wards, to say nothing of the odour of carbolic, iodoform, &c, which invariably clings round a dress worn on duty. Many Hospitals, I know, make it a rule for the Nurses to wear cotton dresses in the Wards, while stuff ones are provided for out-door wear.—Yours faithfully. G. T.
