

that classes should at once be opened for the teaching of Nurses already trained in ordinary work for the special work which they would be called upon to do were cholera to come upon us. This special training of Nurses should be confided to men who have themselves had practical experience of cholera, and who have shown by their published work that they have given thought to what should be done to prevent, if possible, the spread of that disease in a community, and in any event to limit to the utmost its ravages. If full benefit is to be secured from the provision we have suggested, it cannot be too earnestly insisted on that the plan must be carried out immediately. Should we happily, as was our good fortune during the last European epidemic, escape a visitation of cholera, no harm will have been done by our taking all necessary steps to meet any emergency."

I must congratulate the authorities of the R.B.N.A. on the prompt action which they have taken in the matter. It will, I feel sure, be appreciated by the public at large.

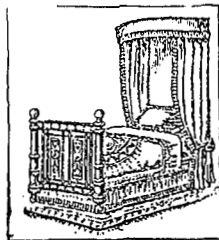
