Dr. BEDFORD FENWICK: These twelve Nurses received no Certificate of Training of any kind from this Hospital?

The CHAIRMAN: No.

Dr. BEDFORD FENWICK expressed his pleasure at hearing that so important a reform had been made, because it had hitherto been the custom at the London Hospital to certify to the public that Nurses were trained, who had entirely failed to persuade their examiners that they remembered what had been taught them.

Mr. HENRY C. BURDETT made a lengthy speech, one statement in which was questioned, and proved to be inaccurate, and the Report was adopted.

Some formal business was transacted, and the meeting concluded.
