Editorial.

THE REGISTRATION OF NURSES.—X.

THE second example to which we have alluded, occurred in 1891, when the *Hospital* stated that on the first page of the Register was the name of a Nurse who had been discharged from her Hospital because the property of another Probationer was found in her possession. The peculiar *penchant* of our contemporary for making accusations of theft was sufficiently well known to somewhat discount the effect of this statement—especially as, on this occasion, it forebore to give the name of the Nurse whom it thus attacked. The Royal British Nurses' Association took no notice, apparently, of this statement; but we made it our business to inquire into the matter. We had no difficulty in finding that the remark could only apply to one Nurse out of those on the first page of the Register, and further investigation proved that she had been a victim of great injustice, and that the statement of the *Hospital* was absolutely untrue and malicious. It is inexplicable why our contemporary, which was so ready to name Miss GERTRUDE JOHNSTONE, should hesitate to name the Nurse in this second case unless it had good reason to believe that, in this instance also, its assertion was unfounded.
