
THE Salvation Army has just opened another of its most practical and well appointed nightshelters. On the 4th inst., General BOOTH spoke at the Meeting which proclaimed it open, and an ample opportunity was given for all to investigate the working of these shelters that are so well arranged for the "great unwashed." The building is divided into three, shall I say sleeping, sections, which vary in cost from threepence to one penny for the night, and those of the callers who have not even one penny, have here the opportunity for earning it, as a room is provided and work given to do equivalent to this then valuable coin. There is one hard and fast rule which all must necessarily appreciate, and that is, that all are compelled to wash before retiring, and while such ablutions are in progress, their clothes are hung in a crematorium, the heat in which destroys all germs, insects; &c., the clothes may contain. Nor are they sent hungry to bed, for a "food bar" is provided at which simple and nice food can be bought at an absolute minimum cost, and those who have not the money, are given a slice of bread which, with the wash and the rest for the penny, is all and more than human nature can expect for that sum.

At the Holborn Restaurant, on the 9th inst., there took place the dinner on behalf of the North-Eastern Hospital for Children, Hackney Road, N.E. The Right Hon. the Lord Mayor was in the chair, and pleaded eloquently for funds to enable the Committee to carry on and increase the valuable work that this Institution is rendering to the poor little sufferers that make application at its doors. The Hospital is situated in one of the poorest neighbourhoods of London, and therefore ought to appeal to all.
