

should the benefits be restricted. Tens of thousands of pounds are, I believe, annually spent by the metropolitan Hospitals in affording medical aid to persons who should be private patients of general practitioners. But instead of weeding out impostors, Hospital managers are too fond of passing round the hat. More inquiry and less begging would have a good effect all round."

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THE management of the Training School for Nurses at New Orleans make the following announcement relative to the school: The lady managers of the New Orleans Training School for Nurses find it necessary to notify physicians and the public that the only authorised Nurses of the training school are those who wear the uniform and the badge, which is a silver crescent, with the initials N.O.T.S., to which the school has the sole right. There are nineteen graduates, who, by having followed the full course for two years have won their diplomas and are practising their profession in this city. These are Mrs. McCaughey, Miss Hobson, Miss Brougher, Miss Ramsey, of class '91; Miss Bruen, Miss Butler, Miss Marshall, Miss Rhodes, Miss Girault, Miss Wyley, Miss Zingalaree, class '92; Miss Little, Mrs. Clem, Miss Viella, Miss Hazelip, Miss Rose Marshall, Miss Lisle, Mrs. Rudosil, Miss Hart, class '93. The new term will begin on the 1st of October. Applications are coming in from Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama. The lady managers ask that all who desire to enter will apply before Sept. 1st, so that before their month of probation is over, the class will be formed and ready for work by October 1st. The standard of the school is high, and will be kept so; only the very best material will be accepted. With the thorough course of lectures given by an able faculty, the watchful supervision of the lady managers, and the practical training in the Hospital under the guidance of so skilled a chief Nurse as Miss Berridge, of the Pennsylvania Hospital, the New Orleans Training School feels that it is offering to students the very best advantages, and points with pride to the success of the ex-graduates, all of whom are in demand at \$20 a week, with board. There are few such lucrative fields open to women. It would be well if the country papers would take this subject up, and prove to the many needy women in the state and elsewhere what advantages lie in having a noble profession, which will enable them to become self supporting and a valuable adjunct to the medical faculty, who have testified to their efficiency and worth by giving constant employment to the Nurses.

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
