Both ladies have been employed by the National Health Society as These appointments will, doubtless, lecturers. lead the other London Vestries to follow a good example.

A SECOND edition of Mr. OWEN LANKESTER'S "Manual on the Human Body" is just about to be issued. This little work has proved most popular and has run through a first edition of 5,000 in a few months. The coloured manikin, illustrating the various organs of the human body in their relative sizes and positions, forms the chief feature of the work, and renders the letter-press more comprehensible to the student.

MISS STACPOOLE'S penny and two-penny pamphlets on "Cookery for the Sick" and "A Homely Talk on Health" have lately been added to the National Health Society's list of publications. They both contain many valuable hints, and the price brings them within the reach of all.

King's College Hospital is making an appeal for £50,000 to carry on its work. As there is no Hospital in London where Nurses receive a more thorough training, its needs appeal specially to all those interested in the efficiency of trained Nurses, and these comprise innumerable persons—rich and poor.

THE Council of the Sanitary Institute have arranged for the following course of free public lectures on the Sanitation of Industries and Occupations, to be delivered by well-known authorities:—I. Occupation and Mortality. 2. Mineral (Non-Metallic) Dusts, the Manufacture of Pottery, &c. 3. Metallic Dusts, Cutlery, Tool Making, and other Metal Trades. 4. Textile Manufactures, Silk, Cotton, Woollen, and Linen Industries. 5. Metallic Poisons; Lead and Arsenic. 6. Manufacture of Alkalis and Acids. These lectures will take place at the Parkes Museum, Margaret Street, W., commencing on Thursday, November 2nd, at 8 p.m.

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
