

"(c) And your petitioners earnestly request your Council to have a Bill introduced into Parliament with the view of making it illegal if any persons—other than those universities and corporations recognised under the Medical Acts—grant any certificate or diploma which professes to authorise the holder to practise any branch of medicine, surgery, midwifery, or dentistry.
"And your petitioners will ever pray, &c."
