MISS M. ORD has been appointed Matron of the Hospital for Women, at Brighton. She was trained at the Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford, where she was promoted to the position of Sister, and subsequently worked as Charge Nurse at the Women's Hospital, Brighton.

MISS MARY SMITH has been selected as Matron to the Eston Infectious Hospital. She received her training at the Brownlow Hill Infirmary, Liverpool, and has held the position of Charge Nurse at the Eastern Fever Hospital, Homerton.

MISS HARRIET RAVEN has been appointed Matron of the District Cottage Hospital at Ashby de la Zouche. She has lately held the position of Matron of the Cottage Hospital at Poole.

MISS VALENTINE has been appointed Matron of the County Asylum, Rainhill. Trained at the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary, Wigan, she was promoted to the position of Sister, from which post she was selected as Assistant Matron at the County Asylum, Lancaster.
