TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES, GENERAL HOSPITAL, TORONTO.

THE following is a brief report of the work of the Toronto General Hospital Training School for Nurses, for the year 1893.

The School has recently adopted a new and pretty

uniform, and as it was found impossible to complete this change in time for the usual annual gathering, the distribution of certificates and badges took place privately. The Report reads as follows:—

Applications for admission, 413 formal and 125 personal; 39 of these were admitted, but only 22 proved satisfactory. After completing the month of probation these were accepted, and become members of the School.

The total number of Nurses now holding the certificate of this School is 181, twenty-five of these having passed their final examination, and completed a two years' course during the past year.

Lectures and classes have been conducted semi-weekly

from October until July.

from October until July.

These lectures are given by many of our most prominent physicians and surgeons, while the classes are under the direction of Miss Snively, the Lady Superintendent. Examinations are conducted every six months, and each Nurse is obliged to take at least 50 per cent. in each subject.

It is gratifying to record that a large number of those who were trained in this School are now holding Hospital positions both in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of those who received appropriatements during the positions.
