R. H. the President. It is remarkable as being an articulate public expression of the aspirations of the Corporation for the establishment of a state-recognised Register of Trained Nurses, based on an independent and similarly recognised examination. The Council is invited to record their thanks to Her Royal Highness, for having called public attention to a consumma-tion which would be the reasonable and natural outcome of the development of Nursing as a vocation, and is, doubtless

the development of Nursing as a vocation, and is, doubtiess, the object of the legitimate ambition of the most thoughtful and intelligent among trained Nurses.

The Executive Committee beg to report that, as yet, no call has been made upon the Roll of Cholera Nurses since it was instituted in the autumn of the year 1892, and to point out that such a result is due to that admirable efficiency of the Sanitary Service of the Country, which has recently received the commendation of the Sovereign.
