THE Royal British Nurses' Association is to be congratulated upon its increasing popularity and influence; upwards of one hundred Nurses applied for Registration at the last meeting of the Board, eighty-eight of whom conformed to the high standard required, and had the honour of being elected and duly entered upon the Register.

THERE is little doubt that the announcement made by Her Royal Highness the President in her Paper before the Congress at Buda-Pesth, that the ultimate aim of the Association's work would result in State Registration of trained Nurses, has gained much sympathy for the work of the Association from those persons who object to tentative measures.

A MEETING of the Executive Committee of the Matrons' Council was held at 2.30 p.m., at the Matron's House, St. Bartholomew's Hospital, on Thursday, the 1st of November. The Council met at 3 p.m., and the Draft Bye-Laws were considered, amended, and adopted. A full account of the Meeting will appear in our issue next week.

THE Nursing School, in connection with Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge, stands deservedly high in public estimation; but this is more the result of the devotion of individuals than a result of the best system of education or arrangement for the efficient Nursing of the sick. We are, therefore, glad to report that at the adjourned Court of Governors, held on the 29th ultimo, the subjects of more accommodation for the Nursing staff, and the desirability of resident Ward-Maids, were under discussion.

The Rev. E. G. WOOD said "That the present accommodation for the Probationers in the building at Addenbrooke's, was not at all in line with the provision given by the best Hospitals at the present time, and in view of the competition which arose between Hospital and Hospital, it was most important for practical purposes, and especially for their financial position, that they should not be behindhand in that matter. He pointed out that they got their Nursing done for nothing, except the Staff Nurses, and said that they should take care
