The case is made of nickeled tin, and is 15 inches long by 5 inches deep. The box contains: 1 lb. lint; 1 lb. absorbent cotton wool; 1 yard gutta percha tissue; 1 yard white jaconette; I tin sticking plaister, domestic and water bandages, I roll Mead's plaister; pincushion with surgical pins; yard measure; surgical scissors; dressing forceps; clinical thermometer; pulse glass; bath thermometer; glass spatula; spirit lamp; nest of test tubes; box litmus papers; matchbox case; medicine glass and minim glass. The case is made by Bailey & Son, of 38, Oxford Street. The Editor has three of these cases left from the Bazaar, and would be glad to sell them for the benefit of the Association, price  $\pounds_2^2$  2s. each.
