You should apply to the principal Training Schools for rules and regulations, but choose only those which give a three years' certificate. It would be wise to keep your present employment ficate. It would be wise to keep your present employment until you have an opportunity of entering a Training School, as the number of candidates for the good schools is so great that waiting for some time is generally necessary. free, Is. Id., a most valuable aid in pointing out to you the advantages of the various Nurse Training Schools.

Probationer D.—We do not think your remark "that most Training Schools exist for the purpose of destroying the health of the Nurses" is by any means justified. It appears to us that in most Hospitals a very great deal is done to conserve the energies and preserve the health of the nursing staffs. From our experience we are almost of opinion that more harm is done to the Nurses' health by what they do "off duty" than when in the wards. So many night Nurses, for instance, dock off as much of their sleeping time as the regulations allow, in order to seek change and amuse-ment, and, as they express it, "keep bright and going" on

strong tea. We are afraid with your views you will not make a very good Nurse. But perhaps you have been reading the "White Slavery" correspondence, and this may have produced a temporary unsettlement of mind.


