This Society supplies to the Public thoroughly competent Nurses, each one of whom has passed through three years of Hospital training and has been Registered by the Royal British Nurses' Association, after full inquiry into her character and capacity.

The Nurses obtain their full fees less $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. to cover the working expenses.

EXTRACT FROM THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT, JULY, 1895.

"The Society has already been fortunate enough to secure the approval and support of 132 medical men, a fact which is an eloquent proof of the high estimation in which Registered Nurses are now held by the medical profession.

The pecuniary benefit of co-operation is shown by the facts that, whereas in ordinary Institutions the Nurses are paid salaries varying between \pounds_{30} and \pounds_{45} per annum (the lower sum being the most usual), the members of this Society have, thus far, worked in the aggregate for 1,698 weeks and received $\pounds_{3,732}$, or almost exactly an average of \pounds_2 4s. a week each. Their total earnings have varied from \pounds_{129} for 51 weeks' work, to \pounds_{12} for six weeks' employment; sixteen of the senior members have, on the average taken \pounds_{111} 12s. each."
