Nurse of a Case of Marasmus, Beckenham.—Dr. Cheadle's recipe of raw meat-juice is perhaps the best you can follow. He recommends that to one part of best rump-steak finely minced, one quarter the amount of cold water should be added, minced, one quarter the amount of cold water should be added, stir well together and allow the beef to soak for half-an-hour in the water, place the whole in a piece of muslin or cambric and express the juice by forcible squeezing. Dr. Cheadle regards raw meat-juice as the most easily digested and restorative of all animal foods, and the most valuable of all nitrogenous preparations for children. We always strongly recommend all private Nurses to have a recipe book, and to constantly jot down recipes and novelties in sick-diet; such knowledge is invaluable to all private Nurses.
