Make the beef-tea in the usual manner, but instead of throwing away the whitish and apparently innutritious meat (but it really has a great food value), pound it in a mortar into a smooth pulp, pass it through a wire-sieve and add it to the beef-tea. Whole beef-tea contains the fibre and albumen of the meat, which the ordinary beef-tea does not.

An Omnibus Frequenter .- We have received several complaints similar to yours as to the practice of Hospital Nurses discussing the most gruesome cases in public vehicles, without the slightest regard to the feelings of nervous ladies and other folk who feel ill when operations, especially those involving much hæmorhage, are discussed with " brutal frankness." We think the fault has arisen from the desire on the part of some very raw Probationers to show off their superior knowledge and nerve power. We all know how very shoppy people are when they are in the initial stages of any study. We have frequently heard young medical students relating—at dinner parties and on many other occasions, in and out of season—the most awful accounts of " cases" they have had.
