Out-of-Work.—We regret we receive many applications such as your own. The Nursing profession is becoming largely over-stocked, and it is impossible that all can find work in Private Nursing. It is impossible that all can find work in Private Nursing. It is very doubtful whether with only one year's training you will obtain any private Nursing in London. Certainly none of what you call the "high class" doctors will give you cases. And it would be decidedly unjust could a "one year trained" Nurse come to London and compete with equal chances with those who have devoted three or four years to learning their profession thoroughly. The best advice we can give you is that you have devoted three or four years to learning their profession thoroughly. The best advice we can give you is that you either undergo a proper training, or that you join a rural Nursing Association. Although we do not approve of half-trained village Nurses—because the poor should be as well nursed as the rich—there still is an opening in such work for Nurses with one and two years' Hospital experience.

Miss Dalziel.—An admirable method of preparing sherry and egg is the following: Break an egg into a bowl, add a teaspoonful of sugar, beat the two together until the sugar is thoroughly mixed with the egg, but not enough to produce "froth." Add two tablespoons of sherry and a quarter of a cup of cold water. Mix thoroughly, and strain into a tumbler. Serve as soon as made.
