Also wreaths from the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff, the House Governor, Resident Medical and Surgical Staff, Mr. G. Barling, Mr. J. C. Lord, Dr. and Mrs. Pogson, Miss Busby (a former Matron), the Students, former Sisters and Nurses, patients of Ward 6, a grateful patient, &c.

At the meeting of the Committee held on Friday, a resolution was unanimously passed expressing great regret at the death of Sister Nix, and sympathy and condolence with her mother and the members of her family in their bereavement.

A Memorial Service was held on Sunday morning in the Hospital Chapel, attended by a large number of the Resident and Nursing Staffs and Household.
