In Section A will be shown general Nursing appliances, such as bandages and dressings; articles designed by Nurses, such as wardbaskets and devices for keeping dressings, &c. Here also will be displayed some beautiful dolls in different Hospital uniforms; hygienic clothing; Nurses' trunks and bags, &c. Here too will be seen the photos of the Matrons, Sisters and Nurses who have given their valuable assistance and advice in organising the Exhibition.

Section B will be devoted to everything connected with the HEAD, with all the Nursing appliances used in operations on the brain, eye,

ears, nose and mouth.

Section C will comprise everything connected with the Throat and Chest, and will be a most interesting centre. In it will appear all the bandages and dressings used in empyemas and every chest operation; pneumonia jackets, tracheotomy appliances, and many most valuable exhibits.

Section D comprising the Abdomen and Pelvis, will embrace the very large field of appliances for abdominal and gynæcological operations and obstetrics. Beds for lying-in patients will here be on view, and all the appliances for ovariotomies, colotomy, rectal opera-tions, &c. This will be one of the most interesting and educational sections, and will prove very valuable to those Nurses who wish to see the very latest and best methods used in these important operations.

Section E will include beds and ward furniture, the different forms of locker, bedside table, in-

valid comforts and appliances.

Section F, which is devoted to diseases and accidents of bones and joints, will afford the opportunity of showing some beautiful handiwork in the shape of splints, pads and specimens of bandaging, models of applied splints, &c.

Section G will comprise operation appliances, and the glass and crockery of the operating

table and theatre.

Dietary Appliances, as Section H, will form an interesting exhibit, showing feeding-cups, crockery and trays set for the Home Hospital, public Institutions and the sick-room.

One part of the Exhibition which will probably always be crowded, is the space devoted to "Objects of Interest to Nurses," wherein will appear medals, badges and certificates, educational items, including charts, case-books, and notes of cases taken by Nurses. And certainly the spot where a suitably-clothed District Nurse appears on a bicycle should be by no means deserted.

The Refreshment Room is arranged and undertaken by the Oriental Association, so that there is no doubt that it will be most charming and artistic. The attendants at the stall are to be dressed in rose and white, so that the

RECORD colours will be in evidence throughout the hall. Refreshments at most moderate prices can be obtained here, and in the adjoining Ladies' Cloak Room visitors may leave their parcels, &c. Many other notable and interesting features are in course of preparation, and will be duly announced later on. Our space this week will only allow us to add that most interesting entertainments and valuable demonstrations of various kinds are being arranged, which will serve not only to make the Nursing Exhibition unique in its value from a professional point of view, but to make it most interesting.
