357, Oxford Street, is also excellent. It is furnished with seven bottles, each bottle being. provided with a red rubber-valved cap. The bottles are filled up to the shoulder, and covered with the caps. They are thus placed in cold or warm water, and brought to the boiling point. The milk is then kept boiling for forty minutes, at the end of which time it is put aside in a cool place for future use.

Another steriliser shown by Messrs. Ayward is also admirable for the same purpose.
