Without knowing you, it is of course impossible to say whether you have the faculty of course impossible to say whether you have the faculty which would lead you to be a successful Lecturer. You need a gift of eloquence, and the faculty of clothing facts about health—which are not in themselves interesting—in a bright, popular, and "taking" way. We have often seen Lecturers reading an essay-like and didactic sermon on health, to village women, whose lack-lustre eyes and weary faces testified to the fact that this kind of teaching did not reach their needs. A Lecturer, to be a success, must be conversant with the homes and daily lives of the working classes, and be prepared to teach them to use the materials they have at hand. 
