The Ancoats Hospital is one of the most useful of Manchester charities, being maintained chiefly for and by the industrial classes, and having in connection with its management a Workpeople's Committee, the members of which last year raised upwards of £355. During the past twelve months 2,205 in patients were During the past twelve months 2,205 in patients were received, and 6,316 cases of accident were treated. It is contemplated to add a Convalescent Home to the much-needed work of this Institution, and no one can fail to agree with the saying of the Chairman at the meeting held last week—"It is impossible," said Sir William Houldsworth, "to exaggerate the benefit and service to men who had passed through the Hospital of a week or a fortnight in the fresh air, where the cure might be completed and the strength absolutely restored." lutely restored."

At the annual meeting of the Sheffield Nurses Home, great stress was laid on the valuable work done by the District Nurses. In addition to the Nurse, who has for several years been working in the crofts, a second Nurse had been appointed, and assigned to an equally poor and crowded neighbourhood, where the services of the District Nurse are eagerly sought for and gratefully appreciated. The statement of accounts showed that the income for the year had amounted to ALSTS. Of which the Nurses had earned amounted to £1,575, of which the Nurses had earned £1,387, and £140 was derived from subscriptions. The Lady Superintendent was complimented on her able management of the Institution.

After having recalled to mind, in a few words, the second Annual Meeting of the "Bond," held at Santpoort, on the 29th of May, 1894, he told his hearers that the illness of the two lady members of the Board of Management must be considered as the cause of the fact that there had been organised no general meeting last year. He expressed his great delight at seeing the zealous, indefatigable secretary-treasuress, Jonkvrowe J. de Bosch Kemper, seated, quite restored, among the members of the Board. With all those who know and esteem the other lady member, Miss Reynvaan, he regretted her absence, and uttered his most sincere wish that she soon may be her old self
