You might obtain a post as charge nurse in an infirmary, or in one of the fever hospitals under the Metropolitan Asylums' Board. The experience gained in some of these hospitals is very valuable. *Private Nurse, Leanington.*—We sympathise with you in receiving so small a salary, when you bring in so much to the institution for which you are working; but until nurses learn the value of combination and co-operation we fear that private individuals will continue to make comfortable incomes by "sweating" the nurses who are willing to work for them. for them.
