It is to be hoped that the general public will realise that upon this occasion the medical arrangements have been properly thought out, and every item carefully looked after, and that if there is any breakdown it will not be the fault of the officers or men of the Royal Army Medical Corps—Fort Atbara, August 5th, 1898.
