I can only say, that the affection and sympathy of the Dutch people, incarnated in this gift, is my greatest and most glorious reward for what I have tried to perform in the interest of this country. It is my most ardent desire to give a worthy destination to this present, and 1 firmly believe, that a philanthropical aim is the worthiest of all.

For a long time already it has been my secret wish to call into life a foundation that would be of great use to a great many of our suffering fellowcreatures. I mean a sanatorium for phthisical patients, in the first place, on behalf of those persons whose financial position does not allow them to go abroad in order to find there aid and comfort for the terrible disease that prevails in our country, and has such very distressing consequences.

In a short time I hope to come into possession of the estate *Pranje Nassau-oord* near Renkum, which I propose to destine for my favourite project. Instructed and advised by fully competent persons, I intend to found on that estate the first Dutch sanatorium.

I am very happy and grateful that the present of the people, that I love, enables me to do so.

May the proof of esteem, now offered to me, be a great blessing to many sufferers in coming years."

When it was known in how noble a way the Queen Regent intended to dispose of this visible expression of the strongly-felt veneration of the Dutch nation, a pealing applause thrilled through the air, and everywhere in our whole country, the name of Queen Emma was pronounced with feelings of sincere affection and profound admiration.

By this action the Queen Mother has raised a undestroyable monument in the hearts of the Dutch people, firmer and stronger than one of marble or granite !
