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Counter Irritation.—A mustard plaster is made by mixing I to 6 parts of flour or meal to one of mustard. These are rubbed thoroughly with cold water into a paste, and spread between two layers of muslin or linen of the size required. The plaster is applied for from IO to 20 minutes, and is covered with folds of linen or absorbent wool to absorb any superfluous moisture. The skins of different persons differ very much in sensitiveness, and the rule is to remove the plaster when the skin is well reddened, and the stinging sensation acute. Delirious or unconscious patients must be especially carefully watched during the application of a mustard plaster or the skin may become blistered. After removal, the site to which a plaster has been applied should be dusted with powder and annointed with vaseline, and covered with a soft piece of muslin.



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
