*Maternity Nurse.*—There are, in our opinion, only two positions which a woman who attends maternity cases can adopt. She must either act as a qualified medical practitioner, or as a nurse That the nurse should be qualified as a midwife before she undertakes the responsibility of attending these cases is obvious, no attendant in maternity cases is, we think, safe without this knowledge; but it is plain that midwifery can never be a distinct profession, because even qualified midwives are only educated to attend cases of normal labour, and their work must always therefore be subordinate to, and in touch with that of medical practitioners.

Mrs. P., Cardiff.—We should advise you to wait until the new issue of the Nursing Directory (which is issued under the authority of the Matrons' Council) is published. It will appear early in the new year, and may be obtained from the offices of the NURSING RECORD, II, Adam Street, Strand, price 5s.
