man or woman, who is helpless from disease or injury, and provide rest, food and care until the sufferer is well again and can go back to the world to be self-supporting, or, alas! is dead, and thereby removed beyond the reach of suffering—is, indeed, a great charity. We have all reason to be thankful that we live in a country We have all -and there are only two such, our own and England-where hospitals are great private charities, and are not under the control of the govern-This governmental control of hospitals is ment. an evil, for there is necessarily entailed a certain feeling of being pauperized when one becomes a charge upon the public purse, whereas a man who becomes a patient in a hospital which is a private institution, only accepts temporary help from his fellow citizens who are kindly disposed. I shall never forget taking into this Hospital, at a time it was greatly overcrowded, a sick man, who told me he would be refused the shelter of the Almshouse Hospital, because he was a non-resident of Philadelphia. That man came in here helpless from disease and almost without A few weeks later I saw him walk clothes. away from the gate decently dressed and in good health, and all this done by the charity of the Hospital.
