With all the glamour of the new society, the kingdom, the power, and the glory, thus suddenly thrust upon him, Graham for a few days remains content. But there is one woman among the throngs, who still cherishes ideals which are like a survival from an age which still dreamed of democracy; and she speaks to Graham, and bids him dare—bids him be a man, and rule. Inspired by her voice, he goes forth into the great awful labyrinth of scientific appliance which London has become, to see scientific appliance which London has become, to see how his people live. And he sees. In this book, as in all others, Mr. Wells puts vividly before us the intense cruelty and selfishness of science per se. He lets us see as with a Röntgen Ray, the awful consequences of knowledge, uncontrolled by religion or morality. The London to which he introduces us is a smokeless London, and of perfect sanitation. But the reign of Love and Liberty has not come with the perfection of drains or the multiplication of labour-saving appliances. Human nature is there, and they have removed the influences that still in our day make for the moved the influences that still in our day make for the unseen and the holy.

Self rules, and self is cruel and rapacious, and lustful and treacherous. Man is his own enemy still, and we see more plainly than ever the rock upon which Zola and Bellamy have split, and realize with a new imperiousness that Mr. Whiteing has got nearest to the solution of the enigma when he proclaims that the only thing to save man is a New Birth.

And the magically awakened sleeper lives just long enough to uproot the deadly tyranny of wealth, and to give to the miserable city its new start at the cost of his own life; as has been the fate of every saviour of society, from the least even to the Greatest.
