It is well to write well in advance, as, during the summer months, the Home is often very full.

Ignoranus.—We do not advise you to enter for training at the institution in question, as the term of training is only for two years; and you would, therefore, at the completion of your training, find yourself ineligible for such appoint-ments as Sister in the Navy or Army and Indian Nursing Services, Charge Nurse under the Poor Law, and in the Fever Henricht of the Metropolitan Acylums Board as well as Services, Charge Nurse under the Poor Law, and in the Fever Hospitals of the Metropolitan Asylums Board, as well as for most hospital appointments of any importance. If you obtain the "Nursing Directory," price 5s., from the offices of the NURSING RECORD, 11, Adam Street, Strand, you will find an account of all the principal training schools, with the term of training in each case, which will help you to decide which hospital you would like to enter. The general training should always preceed the special, so as to form a foundation on which to build. This is the only scientific measure of procedure. Your services are of very little value during the time that you are training, as you are entirely in the position of a pupil.
