Qualifications.—Each nurse must hold a three years' certificate of training, after examination, from a General Hospital, where theoretical and clinical instruction is given. Preference will be given to those candidates who, in addition, have experience in nursing special branches of disease, Gynæcology, Obstetrics, Fever, Nervous Diseases, and Massage. Mental nures must possess a certificate of general training, and, in addition, hold the certificate of the Medico-Psychological Society.

Comments and Replies.

Mrs. J., Bournemouth.—We quite agree with you that it is advisable to bring up all your daughters to a profession. At one time, matrimony was the only recognized vocation for girls, and all the money available was spent on taking them out into society, and in attractive clothes, but now parents are more and more beginning to understand that it is their duty to equip their girls as well as their boys for the battle of life by providing them with a profession by means of which they can, if necessary, gain their living. It is only right that they should be independent of matrimony as a means of subsistence. If they find it their vocation, that is another matter. They may or may not continue their professional work after marriage, but they always have it to fall back upon should occasion arise.

In Doubt.—We do not recommend you to enter any private nursing home as a patient where the Superintendent is not a trained nurse. It is essential, in our opinion, that Home Hospitals, as well as general ones, should be under trained supervision if they are to be efficiently managed.

Home Hospitals, as wen as general ones, should be under trained supervision if they are to be efficiently managed. *Certificated Nurse.*—No definite length of training is decreed necessary by the London Obstetrical Society, but it is necessary that you should attend twenty cases under supervision. If you are able to get these in therefore there is not any reason why you should not enter for the next examination, even though you have not had three months' experience. It is, of course, desirable that you should have this; it is, indeed, all too short, but in your case the circumstances are exceptional.
