Miss P. Bromsgrove.—The National Union of Women Miss P. Mrs. Stevens.—The usual minimum age for probationers in general hospitals is 23 or 24, but some hospitals accept younger pupils. We believe Miss Poole, the Matron of the East Lancashire Infirmary, Blackburn, is an advocate for beginning to train at an earlier age.

Country Matron.—There are two principal organizations of nurses in the United States, the American Society of Superintendents of Training Schools, in which the Canadian Matrons join, and of which Miss L. L. Dock is Secretary, and the National Associated Alumnæ of the United States and Canada, of which Mrs. Hampton Robb is president, the secretary for the present year being Miss M. E. Thornton. Both societies have in their respective capacities done much useful work, with the result that nursing organization is well advanced in the United States and

Canada.

In Doubt.—We do not advise you to enter a fever hospital before getting your general training. This should come first, and the special training should follow.

Nurse P.—We do not think that you should undertake district nursing work, even if you have got your certificate, at the end of two years' training. You should stay on in hospital if possible and get your third year of experience. Now-a-days three years' hospital training is recognized as the minimum necessary. In district work it is especially important to have had at least this amount of training as you are often thrown on your own resources, neither you are often thrown on your own resources, neither experienced ward sister, nor doctor being at hand in cases

which need prompt action.

Monthly Nurse.—The patient should be advised to provide herself with a mackintosh, and with absorbent sheets made of cotton wool and gauze. If you are careful, when they are removed after the labour is over the bed should be stated. You will of course propore it with draw sheet. they are removed after the labour is over the bed should be spotless. You will of course prepare it with draw sheet and mackintosh and not dispense with these for the first fortnight. Mackintoshes which are long enough to tuck in at the sides are much more desirable than shorter ones which are apt to become creased, and in consequence uncomfortable. A child usually begins to cut its teeth at the sixth or seventh month, and the process is not as a rule complete till the second year. complete till the second year.
