sent narrow attitude of mind, that there is but one training school, and that is their own. In a delightful article in this month's *Trained Nurse* on "Nursing in Germany," Miss Dock points out how beneficial these school Alumnæ societies—or, as Bart's has christened them, Leagues—are, and how they tend to raise the general standard of nurses and nursing. We shall await with interest any further information concerning the Bart's League, and I for one wish it the best of good fortune.

#### Motices.

Qualifications.—Each nurse must hold a three years' certificate of training, after examination, from a General Hospital, where theoretical and clinical instruction is given. Preference will be given to those candidates who, in addition, have experience in nursing special branches of disease, Gynæcology, Obstetrics, Fever, Nervous Diseases, and Massage. Mental nurses must possess a certificate of general training, and, in addition, hold the certificate of the Medico-Psychological Society.

### Comments and Replies.

Miss J. P. J. — We quite agree with you concerning your enclosure but we do not see what can be done expect to write to the particular firm in question and to request them to send no more notices.

Probationer.—The three thermometers most often in use are Fahrenheit's, Centigrade, and Réaumur. In this country Fahrenheit's is almost universally used. In this thermometer freezing point is marked at 32°, and, the scale being divided into 180 degrees between freezing and boiling points, it follows that boiling point is 212°. These degrees are purely arbitrary. In the Centigrade thermometer, otherwise the thermometer of Celsius, freezing point is marked at zero, and boiling point is 100°. This thermometer is used in France. In Réaumur's thermometer, freezing point is also at zero, but boiling point is 80°. Centigrade may be converted to Fahrenheit by multiplying by nine and dividing by four.
