with damp heat or burning with dry heat, it is wiser to refrain. If the patient is going to die, he will die whether you wash him or not, but it is just as well not to give an opportunity of saying that it was the washing that killed him.

Diet is another pdint on which most minute instructions must be solicited. In some places milk is very scarce, and is also supposed to be almost fatal to fever patients. The orthodox diet consists of chicken-broth only; champagne is largely used in yellow fever cases. With regard to the bed, "cradles" are unknown, but an excellent substitute for cradles consists in placing chairs with their backs to the bed and stretching a sheet over them. The bottom sheet can be kept perfectly smooth and free from rucks by tying the corners together under the mattress and twisting them in until the sheet is stretched as tight as a drum.

To mention briefly some minor discomforts— "prickly heat" and insect bites are two chronic inconveniences. Cloudy ammonia is excellent for dabbing on all bites and stings; for prickly heat, bathing with thin starch is soothing, and the application of cuticura ointment is excellent for every kind of skin irritation. Bathing prickly heat with Condy's fluid is also held to be beneficial.
