In cases of prolonged fever it excellent pick-me-up. is not always advisable to confine the patient to fluid diet. We can all of us remember prolonged cases of enteric fever in which the temperature never seems to come down until some solid food is given, the temper-ature in such cases being no doubt due to exhaustion. In the same way in certain cases of malaria the temperature is probably due to the same cause, and such cases are benefited by solid food. However, the nursing of malaria is a wide subject. There are many other points to which I should like to allude, but refrain.
